Teachers continue to emphasise to pupils the relationships between sounds and letters, even when the relationships are unusual. Once root words are learnt in this way, longer words can be spelt correctly, if the rules and guidance for adding prefixes and suffixes are also known.

### **SPELLING RULES FOR YEAR 4**

Words containing ch where it sounds like 'sh' or 'k' (such as 'chef' and 'scheme'). Words with the ch sounds where it sounds like ch (as in 'chef' ' and ' machine').

Words ending -gue and -que ( as in 'league' and 'antique').

Words containing 'y' where it sounds like 'i', (as in 'myth' and 'gym').

Words where the 's' sound is spelt with sc (as in 'science' or scene').

## Homophones / near homophones

accept/except, affect/effect, ball/bawl, berry/bury, brake/break, fair/fare, grate/great, groan/grown, here/hear, heel/heal/he'll, knot/not, mail/male, main/mane, meat/meet, medal/meddle, missed/mist, peace/piece, plain/plane, rain/rein/reign, scene/seen, weather/whether, whose/who's.

Prefixes (groups of letters added to the start of a word): -in (as in 'active -inactive'); -im, if root word starts with m or p (as in 'possible-impossible' and 'mortalimmortal'): -ir, if root word starts with r (as in 'regular-irregular'); -inter, (as in 'city-intercity'); -anti, (as in 'clockwise-anticlockwise'); -auto, (as in 'biography-autobiography'); -super, (as in 'star-superstar'). Suffixes (groups of letters added to the end of each word): -er, -ing to verbs, (as in 'begin' 'beginner' and 'beginning'); -ion -ian -tion is used if the root word ends in t or te ( as in 'invent-invention' and 'complete-completion'); -ssion is used if the root word ends in ss or -mit. (as in 'express-expression' and 'permit-permission'); sion is used if the root word ends in d or se, (as in 'expand- expansion' 'tense-tension') -cian is used if the root word ends in c or cs, (as in 'music-musician'); -our is changed to -or before -ous is added. (as in' humour- humorous '); a final 'e' of the root word must be kept if the sound of 'g' is to be kept. (as in 'courage - courageous'); -i: sound before the -ous ending, it is usually spelt as i, (as in 'serious'): a few words have **e**. (as in hideous').



The word list for year 4 is statutory. The specific list is a mixture of words pupils should frequently use in their writing and those which they often misspell. It is important that the children become familiar with the meanings of the words. Some of the listed words may be thought of as quite challenging, but they can easily be taught within the four years of key stage 2, alongside other words that teachers consider appropriate.

Accident, believe, calendar, complete, different, exercise, grammar, interest, opposite, ordinary, particular, perhaps popular, position, possess, possession, possible, potatoes, pressure, promise, purpose, reign, regular, remember, separate, special, strange, therefore, thought, various, weight, woman.



Here at North Downs School confidence in understanding our language starts with rigorous phonics teaching.

This follows a six stage structured approach called Letters and Sounds. Children are expected to know and use the first 100 and 200 words. Details on our website.
