


Year 6 Learning Letter Friday 13th November 2020

Parents' consultation evenings! We are very much looking forward to our virtual meetings and discussing how your children have settled back into the routine of school life.

In class, here's a taste of what's to come:

Maths - multiplying and dividing fractions, and finding fractions of amounts;

English - continuing to work on the skills involved in writing narratives that include a flashback;

History - exploring the reasons why Hitler chose to attempt an airborne invasion of Britain and how he chose his targets;

French - expanding the children's knowledge of prepositions through studying Une Histoire Sombre, a simple short story in French.

When children learn to use syllables well, they will find reading and spelling become so much easier. The skill of segmenting into syllables will help to break words into small manageable chunks.

Listen to the word. Break it into syllables and then identify the phonemes in each syllable e.g:

September

Sep-tem-ber

recognise

re-cog-nise

Have a go at this week's spelling words:

interrupt

lightning

signature

prejudice

physical

parliament

privilege

pronunciation

Then try it with some others too!
